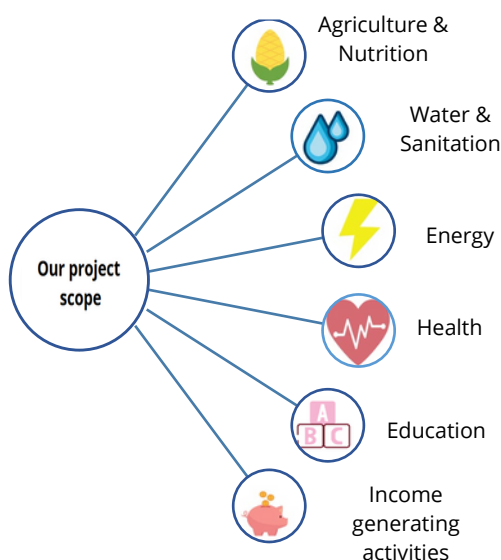


The solidarity of EU staff with the less privileged allows us to respond to local development needs.

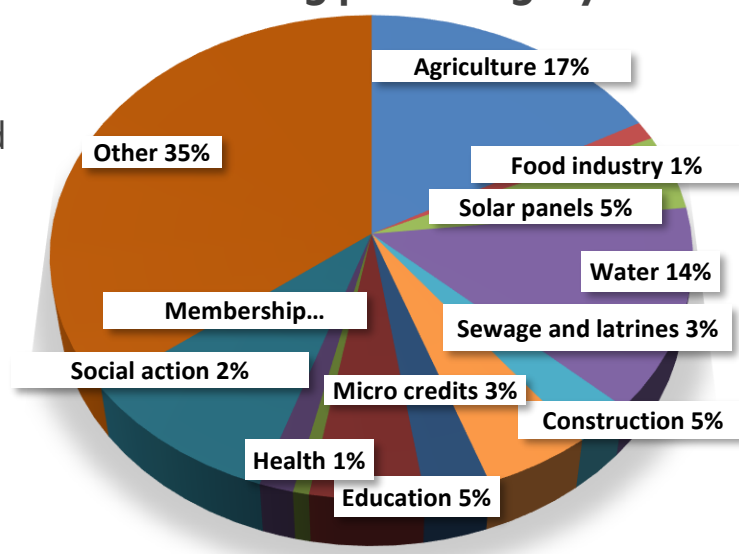

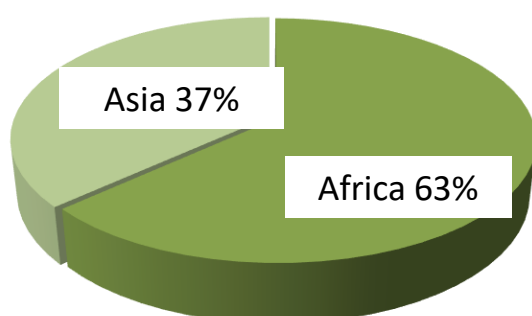

FUNDED PROJECTS

We strive to contribute to sustainable development by helping the most marginalized communities who have urgent needs. Access to **water, electricity** and **income generating projects** are among the most important interventions. We share a few examples of projects funded in 2024.

The Guntur Diocese Social Service and Welfare Society

India: Livelihood Support for COVID Widows

The Guntur Diocese Social Service and Welfare Society (GDSSWS) reached out to us with a funding request to support COVID-widows in six villages of Guntur and Palnadu districts, Andhra Pradesh, India.

The COVID-19 pandemic significantly disrupted Guntur's local economy, stripping many women and their households of stable incomes, especially those engaged in agriculture and informal sectors. Against this backdrop, GDSSWS prioritized investing in the economic independence of poor Dalit women widows as a strategy to break the cycle of poverty and dependency, fostering a ripple effect to uplift entire communities from socio-economic instability.

Eu can aid awarded GDSSWS with 5,484 EUR to implement the project between November 2023 and May 2024. The funding went to 20 beneficiaries for income-generating activities such as livestock rearing, grocery stores, and beauty parlours.

What are the results so far?

GDSSWS project successfully distributed **sub-grants to 20 Dalit women across six villages**, addressing their immediate financial needs and potentially serving as operational capital for their income-generating activities. While the women expressed general satisfaction, many felt the grant amount was insufficient to meet their business requirements, emphasizing the need for pre-disbursement orientation to manage expectations before the selection process.

Beneficiaries' selection process was not corresponding with the established eligibility criteria and a lack of periodic follow-up meetings and systematic data collection, hindered the overall effectiveness of the project.



FUNDED PROJECTS

Œuvre pour l'enfance défavorisée

Democratic Republic of Congo: School benches and culvert for the Saint Antoine de Padoue primary school in Sindi

In Boma, DRC, a shanty town has formed beyond the Sindi river, home to hundreds of families from all corners of the province emigrating from their villages in search of work. *eu can aid* was asked to finance the purchase of **30 school benches and the construction of a small bridge** to provide access to the school during the rainy season. Having lost the only access road when a bridge was damaged, the children and the entire population access the neighbourhood via the only footbridge built by the association. Unfortunately, when the river Sindi rises, its waters swallow up the footbridge, enclosing the entire neighbourhood until the water level recedes.

Eu can aid awarded OED with a **5,000 EUR** to carry out the project.



What are the results so far?

The culvert has been built in concrete and can now be used even by large vehicles.

The school benches have been installed.

eu can aid has not yet received the final report, but the photos published here illustrate the construction of the culvert.

FUNDED PROJECTS

Community Action for Rural Development

India: Income generating project for rural poor women through goat rearing

Community Action for Rural Development (CARD) is a long-standing partner by now operating in Tamil Nadu, India. In 2023 they reached out to us with a multi-year proposal **to benefit 270 poor women over a timeframe of 3 years.**

During year 1, 90 beneficiaries were to be selected. The women would go through a goat management training all together. After which half of them would receive 3 goats each immediately and once the goats breed, they would be responsible for handing out 3 of the new goats to the remaining 45 beneficiaries.

Eu can aid awarded CARD with **7,800 euros** for the goat rearing project which was completed mid-2024



What are the results so far?

The beneficiaries who received three goats during the months of July and August 2023 reared the goats well. Within eight months, they came forward to pass one goat each to another poor woman. By passing of goats as gifts, 15 poor women became new beneficiaries, and they were taught goat management techniques during the house visits.

Beneficiaries are reported to be very happy with the results, they may be able to sell some of the newly bred goats during year 2.

On a less positive note, last year the climate was very hot and the beneficiaries were able to take their goats for grazing in the morning and in the evening. But many beneficiaries were keeping their goats in open place at the backside of their houses.



Our approach to project evaluation and selection

Diligent screening



The first stage or pre-screening is done by the Secretariat.

Out of 237 applications for funding received in 2024, **218 were rejected** by the Secretariat or the Project Group (most common reasons being - amount requested too high or insufficient references).

Professional volunteers



Project group volunteers individually analyse the pre-selected projects more in detail. They interact with the local partner, referees and any other relevant parties to validate the criteria. The assessment is presented to the whole group and if approved to the Administrative Body for the final decision on funding.

Extensive international network



Since several years, eu can aid has created a network of international and European references to which it addresses itself to ensure the seriousness of promoters and their ability to carry out projects. End 2024 a new partnership has been developed with Mr. Shiv Vas from India with long experience in projects' evaluations, visits graciously our projects in the Country.

eu can aid and its partners believe that a long-term commitment can make a real difference for the local population and that different needs must be addressed in an integrated way to make development sustainable.

India: Integrated Intervention in the Saltpan Area of South Tamil Reporting on achievements



INTEGRATED PROGRAMS

eu can aid and its partners Stichting Castricum Helpt Muttathara, the Netherlands, Education World 86, France, and VZW SOS Zoutmijnkinderen-India, Belgium, have decided to support an integrated five-year project in the saltpan area of South Tamil Nadu (India).

A total budget of 125,000 euros has been allocated up to the end of 2024. Six villages have been selected to concentrate the funding on a well targeted population, with the hope this will ensure a sustainable impact. The project is implemented by a large Indian NGO "Social Change And Development" (SCAD NIRMAN) which has been active since 1985 in nearly 600 villages of the area.

In 2024 the Saltpan project continued its implementation, and activities were carried out in several areas to deliver integrated development. In the fall of 2025 the programme is planned to be finalized.



Balwadi (pre-school) is the first step in children's education journey in the village – it lays the foundation for their future learning endeavours. Recognizing the urgent need to renovate the school building, eu can aid supported SCAD in its effort to renovate the building. The community helped raise additional funds and contributed to the restoration. The entire building was refurbished and now welcomes the 26 students.

- ❖ **Governance:** different committees are in place such as Village Development Committees, Health Committees, Young Committees, Women Self Help Groups, etc. Their mission is to coordinate activities in their field. They all received some training, since they will be a key element of sustainability after the end of the project in October 2025. Other activities included two visit-exchanges which took local people to visit other organisations that could provide knowledge useful for the villages.
- ❖ **Education:** this is a key area for SCAD and different actions were undertaken to support local children at all stage of their education. Two very run-down kindergartens (Balwandi) were fully renovated with the participation of the local community.
- ❖ **Health and nutrition:** several specific awareness-raising campaigns were carried out and several "Health camps" were organised in the villages to provide direct health advice.
- ❖ **Environment:** an environmental awareness campaign was carried out, as well as a "Tree Planting Initiative".
- ❖ **Income generating activities:** these were promoted through skill training and the creation of a capital fund to support small businesses.
- ❖ **Water management:** two Ooranies (traditional pond storing water from the monsoon) were renovated in two villages with the participation of the local community.

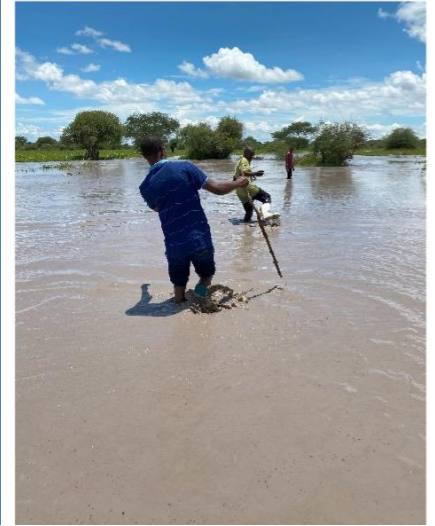
Tanzania: Integrated Intervention in Mdughuyu

Reporting on achievements: what has been done so far?

[The Tanzania Development Trust \(TDT\)](#), in partnership with *eu can aid*, is successfully implementing a comprehensive village development program in Mdughuyu, Singida Region. The program aims to improve the lives of the community through initiatives focused on clean water, education, healthcare, and agriculture.



Mdughuyu is situated in a very remote area. The next closest town to Singida is situated around 93 km away to the east. While in the dry season villagers have to walk 14km to collect water (picture on the left), during the rainy season the last 5km to the village are impassable by vehicles (picture on the right).



❖ **Access to water:** The project is transforming access to clean water as well as saving time taken collecting water. The need for this clean water infrastructure was made clear by the recent Cholera outbreak infecting over 50 people in the sub village. Work is now ongoing to connect it to the Dispensary and Primary school which are next to each other.

❖ **Healthcare Access:** The Mdughuyu Community Dispensary, completed in 2024, is poised to provide essential healthcare services to over 3,557 residents. It has gone through a first test October of 2024 when a cholera broke out in a nearby village resulting in 40 patients being hospitalized at the dispensary. This dispensary has already clearly saved lives.

❖ **Sanitation:** In September 2024 a toilet block of 6 toilets was built to improve sanitation and hygiene for the 387 students and 6 staff add to the 6 that were on site for a school of about 400 students

Total granted amount: **15,500 EUR**

Conclusion: The integrated village development program in Mdughuyu has demonstrated the transformative power of community-driven initiatives. By addressing the critical needs of the community, the program has improved health, education, and livelihoods. The village chairperson has said that before the project they felt forgotten but that has all changed with this project

Institutional Activities and Communication

Communication

We normally contact the staff of EU institutions through our annual **newsletter**. This helped us to recruit new members, obtain donations and find new volunteers. For reasons beyond our control also in 2024 we were unable to send the newsletter. We are looking for other ways to inform EU officials about our existence and our activities. We also encourage our members to inform their colleagues about the association.

An article on our activities and goals was published on DG HR's Intranet. While we appreciate the opportunity to share news about eu can aid, the impact of the article was quite limited – resulted in few new volunteers and new members.

Partly due to the communication problems our **membership** at the date of 31 December 2024 was of 360 members only. We also face problems when members leave the institutions or change place of employment and don't inform us of their new email addresses.

The work of the volunteers

Here we have really positive conclusions - despite a long list of project applications which we receive every week the projects are analysed efficiently. The members of the project group have a **really remarkable sense of commitment** and attachment to the voluntary work. We should also emphasise the sense of professionalism shown by each member when analysing the positive and negative of each project with the aim of ensuring that the funds made available by donors are spent well and diligently.

Institutional Activities

General Assembly (GA) - 30 June 2024

The GA was organised by written procedure as has become the norm since the Covid-19. The GA was run correctly in line with the rules: the annual accounts were approved as was the discharge of the Administrative Council and the Governing Body members elected unanimously.

Other Institutional activities - the update of the UBO register and the deposit of documents with the 'Greffé du Tribunal du Commerce' was also done as required of eu can aid in 2024. These rules involve a heavy administrative burden that small and medium-sized associations have difficulty in carrying out

Participation in the Ekiden Marathon 2024 – eu can aid was one of the beneficiaries of the donations of the runners from the EU institutions. With the support eu can aid funded a solar powering of a water source and tree planting in Senegal.



We thank our partner **Solar Solidarity International asbl** for its generous contribution to installation of solar panels in a health centre in Benin

A call on donation launched by the EU staff in support of Maroc earthquake victims, allowed us to contribute to a project run by **Electriciens sans frontières** in the Country and concerning solar power.

Member feedback survey

A member feedback survey was conducted about their motivation in supporting our action as well as to involve them in improving our communication.

What did we learn from the results?

- 57 respondents out of 398 email addresses = 14% response rate
- More than 50% of the respondents have been members for 10 years or more
- 80% found ECA via the communication channels of the Commission or another European Institution
- 90% find email newsletter the most effective way of communication
- Respondents were motivated to donate because ECA has direct impact, no admin costs and supports small projects
- Among the reasons to increase the support in the future were: in-person events and opportunity to follow-up the results of a project
- Some of the suggestions to improve: more publications, attending events, involving more members through selection of projects and their follow-up

PROJECTS SUPPORTED BY EU CAN AID IN 2024

Africa

BENIN

NGO: ASEP

Project: Goat rearing

Awarded amount : 5,076 EUR

This project is part of a series of six projects promoted by the same NGO whose first (lighting a health centre) has just been completed. This second project supports women in cooperative raising goats. Each woman will receive 2 goats and can sell the kids that are appreciated as meat

BURKINA FASO

NGO: CVD ZAOGO

Project: Creation of a canteen for a high school

Awarded amount: 5,000 EUR

A school canteen will be constructed for a high school with more than 400 students, whose many do not have any food at lunchtime. The canteen will improve students' academic performance.

DRC

NGO: OED

Project: Benches and culvert for an elementary school

Awarded amount: 5,000 EUR

It is a matter of purchasing 30 benches for a primary school located in a slum, and constructing a small bridge to allow safe access to the school despite the flooding of the river during the rainy period. The beneficiaries are 360 students. Benches are essential to follow the lessons.

NGO: PNS

Project: Water sources development

Awarded amount: 4,000 EUR

The funds allocated are intended for the development of two sources, which would be mainly for refugees from Congo-Brazzaville (more than 2,500). The development will be accompanied by the formation of an indigenous committee to ensure its maintenance, with health information for beneficiaries.

GHANA

NGO: COMMDEF

Project: Construction of four-seater toilet

Awarded amount: 8,860 EUR

The application is for the construction of a school toilet. Now, students in this school located in a very poor village use the surrounding bushes. This causes illness, absenteeism and particular problems for girls. The equipment will consist of 4 gender units with a cloakroom and hand washing points. Modern technology will be used for rainwater recovery. Maintenance will be provided by a student and teacher club and funded by a vegetable garden and peanut farm.

KENYA

NGO: FLOWERS of HOPE

Project: Construction of 4 classes and latrines

Awarded amount: 8,000 EUR

Flowers of Hope wants to build four classrooms and washrooms. The local community will help with the construction. The project will be managed by the NGO's self-help group. About 300 people will benefit, the majority of whom are women; many have not had access to secondary education.

MADAGASCAR

NGO: MAD'AGRI

Project: Solar panels

Awarded amount: 5,500 EUR

The request concerns the financing of a solar installation for an environmentally friendly agricultural training centre, in conjunction with a local association. Technical education trains young people to grow new crops for customers who consume imported products. Production techniques are environmentally friendly and based on agroecology.

TANZANIA

NGO: KEYDEO

Project: Water tank for a primary school

Awarded amount: 6,950 EUR

The project consists in installing a water reservoir for an elementary school. It will be fed by rainwater from the roof. The water will be used for human consumption, cooking, sanitation, and vegetable irrigation during the dry season. This reservoir will prevent waterborne diseases because the spring located a few kilometers away is also used by livestock.

TOGO

NGO: Louvain Coopération

Project: Improved stoves for the recovery of rice waste

Awarded amount: 4,879 EUR

The project is part of the wider Louvain Coopération programme and is developing a previous project (recovery of this waste by their transformation into bio-coal and fuel briquettes). It concerns the diffusion of improved stoves for the recovery of waste from rice husking (bales). These stoves allow the recycling of this rice waste while fighting against deforestation.

NGO: ASoVi

Project: Benches and tables for a primary school

Awarded amount: 4,600 EUR

This is the purchase of 100 benches and tables for a primary school where many children are displaced due to the security crisis in the Sahel. The resulting increase in the number of students forces some children to sit on the floor and copy lessons.

UGANDA

NGO: RAFO

Project: Reconstruction of a primary school and nursery

Awarded amount: 8,560 EUR

The reconstruction of a primary school and nursery was launched by refugees who fled Rwanda during the genocide. The poverty rate is very high.

PROJECTS SUPPORTED BY EU CAN AID IN 2024

Asia

INDIA

NGO: RCLWA

Project: Tailoring centre

Awarded amount: 5,000 EUR

This project is a cooperation with eu can aid (EUR 5000), Casticum Muttathara, NL (EUR 5000) and Wilde Ganzen, NL (EUR 5000). Wilde Ganzen will make a lump sum payment of 15,000 to the beneficiary for the addition of a first floor in a sewing centre. This would enable 240 disadvantaged women to be trained per year. The centre welcomes people from families of lepers. This training should enable them to find work in companies in the neighbouring town or to start as self-employed.

NGO: VIEWS

Project: Vermicomposting

Awarded amount: 5,400 EUR

The project consists in producing and marketing organic fertilizers as vermicomposting. It is aimed at 50 marginalized women, most of whom are widows or single mothers. These fertilizers will improve soil quality and save the cost of chemical fertilizers. Each centre will have a well and will be managed by self-help groups. This project will increase the low income of these women by a third.

NGO: ADVENTURE AID

Project: Tailoring

Awarded amount: 2,600 EUR

Adventure Aid introduced a sewing project for 45 single mothers or young poor women without training. After a training each woman receives a sewing machine and a certificate. This will allow them to earn a higher remuneration than small agricultural jobs.

NGO: CARD

Project: Goats rearing

Awarded amount: 9,500 EUR

The project is developed over three years and concerns the financing of a goat farm for poor women. The first year's results for 45 women are positive, so there is a reason to extend the project for a second year. A second group of 45 women will receive goats from those given in the first year.

NGO: VIRID

Project: Goats rearing

Awarded amount: 4,000 EUR

The request concerns the funding of goat breeding in support of tribal women. Each woman will receive 20 goats, which should increase her monthly income from 4000 to 7000 rupees. They are part of self-help groups and will be helped by a training centre,

NGO: SVG

Project : Vegetable production

Awarded amount : 7,500 EUR

The project aims to increase vegetable production in five tribal villages. In the first year, 50 farmers would be trained in commercial pulse crops, 50 in high value-added market gardening and 100 vegetable gardens would be established in the five villages. Products could be sold in markets close to cities.

NGO: KUDUMBAM

Project: Processing Moringa Oleifera leaves

Awarded amount: 5,600 EUR

The funding is for processing moringa oleifera leaves. This native tree grows quickly and resists drought. Its leaves are used as vegetables but also as traditional medicinal plants. Each woman would receive seeds. This project is expected to double the income of the 20 women beneficiaries.
